BOARD MESSAGE

St. Patrick's Season Reminds Us of All of our Irish Heritage

Twelve months ago, after several weeks of intense preparation, and developing a robust March St. Patrick's season program for the Center, we were broadsided just days prior to kicking off several annual activities. Participation in the parade, attending St. Patrick's church for mass, and hosting hundreds of members at our post-parade party, all fell victim to the strict Shelter in Place (SIP) order handed down by the city. While the 2020 Grand Marshals dinner passed off without incident on Feb 28, as we honored Con Lyons, little did we know how our entire world would change within two short weeks, with the onset and spread of Covid-19.

Nothing has been the same since. We continue to wear face masks, wash our hands more frequently than ever before, and maintain social distance where possible. Many of our older members have been house-bound all year, and while some of our members contracted Covid-19, they thankfully made a full recovery. Many of the children of our members are still not back in school or college, and with the end of the scholastic year approaching-these students may not be back until the Fall. Several legacy hospitality establishments in the area closed during the year, e.g. Cliff House, Seal Rock, and Marcellos. The Irish Center, as a cultural institution was lucky to be able to rely on its members to come to our aid, as part of the St. Patrick's Appeal, which helped fill in the void of not being able to generate any revenue in March. Our move to outdoor dining commenced in June, as soon as the city lifted the SIP order. Since then we have figured out our way around many obstacles to keep our membership engaged, bills paid, capital preserved, and even maintained our cultural programming activities.

Thankfully, the I70th annual St. Patrick's Day parade will happen this year, although online in a new virtual platform, delivered by the United Irish Societies. Throughout the City and across the country, Irish Centers, bars, and restaurants will dust off the Irish decor, hats, and flags, round up Irish musicians and dancers and start boiling the corned beef and cabbage so that we might all feel a bit of hope: adorning our green socks, our Irish Aran sweaters, our green baseball caps, t-shirts or GAA County jersey. Saint Patrick's Day is a day that we honor a Saint from the 5th Century who became one of the Patron saints of Ireland, right next to Saint Brigid and Saint Columcille.

It's been a busy month behind the scenes here at the Center. We finally got to install the new canopy in the back parking lot on February 3rd. The total investment in the tent structure was close to \$10,000. The canopy should provide shelter from the wind and rain. Many thanks to all the volunteers, who came out to help with the installation. While it took several hours to put the frame of the structure together, it took less than a minute to hoist it into place! We did hire some professional riggers to guide us. Kevin Humprey and his carpet cleaning crew did an absolutely amazing job on the carpets on the west side staircase and St. Patrick's room. Superbowl Sunday brought out many Wawona Gates patrons, and there was a lot of cheering when San Mateo native Tom Brady hoisted the Vince Lombardi trophy.

On February 21st, our first annual Irish Bread-making competition drew a record 69 entries. The selection of bread varied in presentation, size, variety, composition, and texture-no doubt reflecting generations of family recipes, and regional influences. Congratulations to all the winners. The biggest winner

on the day was the St. Vincent De Paul Society (SVDP) homeless outreach center at 525-5th Street. All the baked competition bread was donated to the SVDP. Another "Sold Out" sign went up early online for the Irish Pancake Breakfast on Sunday, Feb 28. Over I60 patrons dined on pancakes, sausages, and fruit hosted by the Millbrae Pancake House and Java Beach Cafe. We honored the deceased members of the UICC at St. Gabriel's church on the morning of February 28th.

During February, we expanded the Irish Shoppe retail offerings to include Fresh Irish Soda and Brown bread, from Fiddlers Green, in Millbrae. You can order online or get to the Shoppe early on Saturdays to purchase a loaf. More recently, we have started to sell Donnelly Irish sausages, black and white pudding, and Irish rashers (bacon). So stop by any day that we are open at Wawona Gates and say hello to Josephine Brogan. Free local delivery is available to those that are house-bound, and you can use the order form in this month's Bulletin to purchase your favorite Irish goods. Phone orders are also welcome.

The Spring retail boutique will take place on March 6th and 7th. This was a very successful venture last December, so come out and browse all the local artisans, artists, and mom and pop retailers selling their goods and services.

The 2021 United Irish Societies Grand Marshals Dinner will be a Grab and Go from the Center on Friday, March 12th in association with Knights Catering. See the UIS advert in this month's Bulletin to score \$10 off each order.



The Future of the Irish Center Starts Now

I attended the extraordinary general meeting (EGM) at the Irish Center in October 2018, when it was announced that the Bar, Restaurant and Banquet facilities were closing due to the large losses incurred by those activities, in the years prior. In hindsight, the institutional structural change from a 50Ic7 social club to a 50Ic3 not-for-profit cultural organization was a tumultuous experience for the board at the time. It was difficult to

navigate and develop a whole new way of fulfilling the obligations and commitments to Irish culture, music, history, and as a cultural space for other arts groups and non-profits.

The bottom line economics didn't lie, the UICC was no longer generating enough money annually to stay afloat. Although the Center greatly expanded its cultural programming and made the center available to many other groups in the community, in the end, it was not financially self-sustaining. Something drastic had to be done, and it was with great sadness and dismay, especially to the generation that dreamed up the concept and built the Irish Center, that its doors were shuttered on Dec 31, 2018.

Since that time, the Irish Center has been open on an

irregular basis for cultural events and evenings devoted to entertaining its loyal membership. All during this time we have maintained regular access to our cultural gem -the Patrick J. Dowling Library on 45th Ave. However, since March 2020, following the outbreak of Covid-I9 we have been excluded from holding any events inside our building. This has set us back no end. It's been one crushing blow after another in the massive effort to turn the fortunes of a once-great institution around, which has been a bastion for Irish-Americans in the community for the past 46 years. In an effort to try and keep the doors to the Center at least open for regular activities for the community, I volunteered to step onto the Board to help steady the ship in the spring of 2019. Throughout the year, many new ideas were tried and tested. The dining room was turned into a live entertainment venue, Irish music sessions returned, as did storytelling evenings. Fight Nite was held on a balmy summer evening and we held our first Oktoberfest that Fall. We hosted several live concerts throughout the year, culminating with the Young Wolfe Tones at year's end. Catering for our client parties, receptions, and dinner dances were all provided by outside entities. The model of being open on a limited amount of weekdays, in addition to low overheads with volunteer labor, in combination with conservation measures dramatically reduced the financial stress on the center and we ended the year in the black for the first time in many

years. Engaging lapsed and potential new members all year was a continuous goal, and still is.

What we learned in 2019 as we tried to make it solely as a cultural event center is that the facility does not meet the needs of the modern client. Many of the rooms are not very functional, and there is a serious lack of the necessary computer, light, and sound technology hook-ups in the available rooms. The library is bursting at the seams, and several of the facilities systems; HVAC, elevator, electrical, fire alarm, and plumbing are continuously being repaired and serviced. It's a band-aid on top of a band-aid all the time. Ask anyone of those associated with the building over the past few decades. John Manning, Martin Falvey, Mike Bowler, and others can all attest to the deferred maintenance throughout the 20,000 square foot facility.

Since the outbreak of the COVID-19, our resolve as a Board has been mightily tested. But we have made serious progress in 2020 to engage our membership with the unveiling of Wawona Gates and the Irish Shoppe, further cost-cutting measures, preserving capital, conserving energy and waste.

For the first time in a generation, there has been positive news emanating from the corner of 45th and Wawona Street in the Outer Sunset. We finished 2020 in a better position than we did in 2019. I am grateful to all those who provided

> tremendous financial support for our St. Patrick's Appeal and membership dues which came in at record levels. A special thank you to all our dedicated volunteers who are helping to keep our Community center vibrant in these difficult times.

> So, with the turning of the New Year, the Board of the UICC has held exploratory meetings with several active members in the community who have decades of experience in the construction industry. We have partnered with them to

explore how might the Irish Center benefit from a possible future refurbishment, remodeling, or rebuilding project. These early conversations should help us provide a solid foundation for the next generation of Irish Americans to enjoy the Irish Center like the generation that has gone before us.

One of the people we have spoken to is Redmond Lyons, who has put his own thoughts on paper for you to read this month.

We plan to hold a public meeting in late April 2021, to engage the UICC community about how best to move ahead with any type of development at the Center. Until then, you can go online to www.irishcenter2025.org and sign up to learn more about the future of the Irish Center.

Shin Guards For Progress

It is just over two years since I brazenly stood up at the Irish Center EGM to give my opinion as to its future and what I thought needed to be done. I rashly proposed demolishing the Center in order to rebuild and bring it into the 21st century. My ankles are still sore from my wife kicking me as I stood there for my apparent insensitivity and disregard for all the people who first of all had the fore-

sight to build the Center and then for all those people who have since given of their time, talents and energy to keep it going. That I dared to have an opinion let alone voice it when I had never been involved in any aspect of the Center but had instead taken it for granted, merely paid my membership and shown up for the various events there, was an affront to those who worked so hard for so long.

Then just around this time last year, as COVID seeped into the world and became the main focus of our lives, I had minor knee surgery to repair the damage from my glory days as a Young Irelander, but more likely a result of my bad golf swing. At the time, my recovery seemed not only painful but a frustrating experience as I was relegated to the couch. Little did I know that the rest of the world would soon be joining me in a new locked-down life.

Evenings went well for a while - we had Netflix, no arguing what to watch, but even that got stale soon enough as the fear of COVID began to take hold and our world ground to a halt. While I frequently complained of the pain in my knee and my wife frequently complained of the pain of me being in pain, we found the stillness of lockdown gave us plenty of time to reflect on the lifestyle and, more importantly, the communities that we previously took for granted and focus on our priorities and values. I thought about how lucky we are to live here in San Francisco, all the people we've met, the friends we've made, and the Irish and Irish-American community that made it so easy for us to fit in, find work, and feel welcomed. This is not always the case for all immigrants who lack that same support system.

It gave me time to fully realize the insensitivity of my comments at that EGM proclaiming that it should be demolished and rebuilt. When you work in construction like so many of us have done in the Irish community you learn quickly that a quick fix and remodel can be more costly, less efficient, and impractical than starting afresh and building from the ground up. We drive around town, slow down at every construction site, and get inspired by the different approaches and designs. So now with my shin guards firmly in place, and Mary more than a leg's length away, I'm up on my soapbox again.

When the Irish got together over forty-five years ago to buy the plot and build the Center, they had a great understanding and vision of what the community needed at that time. The construction of the Center was more than just a physical endeavor, it also built an inter-generational community that would go on to call the Center home.

Now with the passing of time, the lifestyles and needs of our community have changed considerably. FaceTime and WhatsApp have taken over, so friends and family in Ireland are now as readily accessible as someone across town. With the emergence of GAA Go and live-streaming, we no longer need to groggily drag ourselves out to the Center at six o'clock in the morning to see Mayo try again. Yet with all these advances, COVID has, again and again, highlighted the significance of physically gathering.

I still feel strongly that there is a need for the Irish Center but it's time to reevaluate and identify what the current and future needs are and adapt to meet those. We have seen through the success of Wawona Gates the Center's adaptability and new ways of bringing the community together. Now is the time to put the question out there whether it should be expanded and revamped to realize the current needs, whether it be to provide a floor for an expanded library, an Irish-American history museum, open art exhibition space, another floor to provide flex space for the various Irish organizations, cultural events, senior Center, space for an artist in residence, etc., the list goes on.

Mine is only one of the many visions for the way forward, there are plenty more. Many people have already offered their support to join in a serious conversation about the Irish Center's future. It is my hope that many more people will also join in this effort and that it not be seen as an effort to take over the Center but rather a commitment to work with the board to regroup in the visionary spirit of those who founded the UICC.

We all know the importance of our Center, what's unclear at present is how exactly we need to move forward. The Center is at a crossroads. At a minimum, it needs a huge amount of deferred maintenance. Whether it's to do a quick fix or remodel and reenvision to meet the current and future needs, or whether we go braver again and start anew. No matter which way is the way forward, we need people to voice their opinions, agree to a consensus, and then every one to row in together to achieve our goal (easier said than done).

In ten years' time, we don't want to look back and realize we should have done something sooner. I believe we now have the opportunity to create something wonderful and leave a legacy for the future. Now is the time that we need to make a decision on what needs to be done and then act on that to create a state-of-the-art United Irish Cultural Center that will provide and inspire for the next generation.
