2023 Grand Marshal — A capacity crowd of 400 people attended the United Irish Societies Grand Marshal dinner on Friday February 24th here at the Center which marks

the official kick off of the St. Patrick's season. Galway native Pat Uniacke is this year's St. Patrick's Day Grand Marshal—a well-deserved honor indeed for a man that has given so much to the Bay Area community over the years. Congratulations to Pat and his wife, Una, and family. We also congratulate the families of the Honorary Grand Marshals; Nicole Killegrew, Jerry Keohane, Katherine (Katy) O'Shea, Mike Alvers, and Barry McGrath.

Irish Ministerial Visit — Consul General, Micheál Smith will be busy around the St. Patrick's season as Irish government representative Simon Harris, Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science will be hosted here in San Francisco. Minister Harris plans two visits to the Irish Center during his time here. He will attend the Post Parade Party with the community on March II and will meet the Irish Center Board on March 12 to discuss the 2025 Project.

Entertainment Galore — Hats off to the St. Patrick's Board subcommittee who have spent the last several weeks preparing for the festivities during March. Pre-planning began in January, led by Events lead, Aileen Dulohery, and a team of board members and volunteers. There is something for everyone who is Irish (or Irish at heart) this month at the Center. The Black Brothers (Michael and Shay), along with Felim Egan and Eamonn Flynn kick off the musical entertainment with a show in the Emerald Pub on Friday, March 3. We have a multitude of local musicians performing on March II, I2, and I7. I must highlight the music concert featuring Co. Wexford, Ireland group The Green Road with soprano Clodagh Kinsella on Sunday, March 12 (after Green Fest). Not to be missed. Then we have Runa, a Celtic American roots band performing on March 19—their guitarist is fresh from the red carpet having received a Grammy nomination. Not to mention all the local dance schools and pipe bands that will be sharing their talents throughout the season.

Green Fest Block Party — We host the annual Green Fest block party on March 12 with our partners the United Irish Societies, Java Beach, and Cooley-Keegan Comhaltas. Ivor Collins, the Irish pipers, and Irish dancers are just some of the entertainers lined up for the day. We will have face painting for the kids as well. Enjoy a classic car show on Wawona Street during the festival, and wander into Wawona Gates for a respite. Party starts at IIam and runs until 5 pm. Entertainment will continue in the Emerald Pub after.

Be Proud to Be Irish, and Look for Us in the SF St. Patrick's Day Parade — This St. Patrick's season proudly hang an Irish flag from your home or business. This year tell the world you are Irish and show how proud you are of your "Irishness". Join us in welcoming two new (but not unfamiliar) faces to the team. Meet Eileen Mize who heads up our "Keepers of the Steps" program and lends her graphic design and social media talents and the accomplished actor, teacher, writer, storyteller, choreographer Máire Clerkin who has been involved with several UICC youth programs from Irish Camp to Zoom storytelling events.



Eileen Mize is a veteran communications professional with a passion for Irish arts and culture. Her toolbox of creative skills including graphic design, writing, storytelling, social media, and marketing communications, coupled with a lifelong passion for Irish culture and arts that began at a young age with her involvement in Irish step dancing, make her an asset to the Irish Center. Eileen is a 3rd generation SF Irish American and enjoys giving back to a place that has been at the heart of many events in her life — from feiseanna, the Rose of Tralee, and dance-outs, to concert going and special events.

Eileen's professional career with non-profits in Catholic and independent schools and currently with the Dominican Sisters of San Rafael, give her the broad experience of managing projects and programs as well as fundraising and events. Eileen is a builder—she builds community, creates interest, develops relationships, and is adept at creating and cultivating social media engagement.

Eileen is a proud alumni member of the McBride School of Irish Dance having enjoyed many years of competition and comradery in the SF Bay Area Irish dance community—including a couple of visits as a solo competitor to Oireachtas Rince na Cruinne. She was an active performer in various festivals and stage shows featuring Irish step dancing including the California Revels' production of "Christmas in an Irish Castle," the Northern California Renaissance Faire production of "Shanachie, the Challenge of the Sidhe" (for several seasons), and The Great Dickens Christmas Fair, as well as providing dance accompaniment for several Irish musicians and bands including The Black Brothers, Melanie O'Reilly, Avalon Rising, Cat Taylor and Fiddler's Fancy, Ellery Klein, and many others. Her work with these musicians sometimes extended into marketing and communications and even album cover design! Eileen loves supporting Irish artists and attending feiseanna and supporting our local dancers and dance schools in any way she can.

As a member volunteer, Eileen leaned on her relationships within the local Irish dance community to play an integral role in creating "Keepers of the Steps"—a UICC special collection of stories and ephemera collected (and still being collected) that tell the history of Irish step dancing in the San Francisco Bay Area. Embracing "Keepers" as her passion project, Eileen continues to develop new and exciting ways to expand the program and the collection and is currently working on the script for a virtual tour of the exhibit to be launched on International Irish Dance Day, September 17. "Keepers of the Steps" is planning a summertime Pop-Up Exhibit at the UICC in August, and is investigating other venues in the Bay Area as well.



Máire Clerkin is a choreographer, director, teacher, actor, writer, storyteller, voice actor, performance coach, and former Irish dance adjudicator with An Coimisiun le Rincí Gaelacha. Máire was recently appointed external examiner for Irish Dance Performance at University of Limerick. She is a Master Teaching Artist with Los Angeles Music Center, Segerstrom Center for the Arts and LA Arts Group.

Máire specializes in Irish dance and drama, with a background in theatre and journalism, designing programs for California's arts curriculum. Teaching credits include Loyola Marymount University, University of Limerick, Royal Festival Hall, Weekend Arts College (Youth Program), Yorkshire Dance, Cois Ceim, Blás Summer School, United Irish Cultural Center San Francisco Summer Camp, The Players Conservatory, Aman Dance Educators, and Santa Monica College.

From London of Irish parents, Máire's dance theatre companies performed throughout Ireland and the UK since the 1980s. Her award-winning solo show *The Bad Arm — Confessions of a Dodgy Irish Dancer*

toured North America, Dublin, Edinburgh Festival & London's West End and culminated at Oireachtas Rince na Cruinne in Greensboro, North Carolina in 2019. Máire has created numerous dance dramas which enjoyed regional, national and international success. Other credits include *Telling LA* on PBS TV; *World City* at Walt Disney Concert Hall; *Music Makers* Schools on BBC TV; *Revolver* on BBC World Service; *Dancing on Dangerous Ground*, Radio City New York and Theatre Royal Drury Lane; *Unconnected Soundings*, Royal Opera House; *Centenary Knees Up*, South Bank; Fennels, *Flannels & Funnels* with John Hegley, The Place; collaborations with DV8 and Peter Sheridan; artistic director/ co-founder *The Hairy Marys* and *Clerkinworks*.

Máire's program *Once Upon a Time in Ireland* - Irish Storytelling for Children – is performed in schools & libraries, and online. Her screenplay, *The Jig is Up* is currently in development for production.

THE UNITED IRISH SOCIETIES HONOR PAT UNIACKE, GRAND MARSHAL OF THE 2023 ST PATRICK'S DAY PARADE

The United Irish Societies of San Francisco have selected Pat Uniacke—one of the most popular members of the Irish community—as the 2023 St Patrick's Parade Grand Marshal. It is a well-deserved honor for someone who has given so much to the cause of Irish sport and to the broader community. Pat is truly a good friend to all who meet him and a wonderful representative of the Irish in the Bay Area.

He was genuinely surprised to be selected as Grand Marshal: "That is something that one never thinks about, it comes as a complete shock to me. It is a huge honor for the family and myself."

Pat was born in 1954 as the sixth of thirteen children born to Michael and Bridie Uniacke in rural Craughwell, County Galway. Pat's father Michael who "came from a family of craftsmen, coach builders," was the local hurley maker, and with eight brothers and four sisters they were never short of players for a puck around the back field. Hurling was in his blood as his grandfather, Brian Uniacke, held three Galway Senior Hurling medals.

Pat learned about the crafting of hurley sticks from his father: "You have to find the ash, it should be growing from the side of a hill," the most suitable branches "grow out horizontally and then vertically, making a half circle or an arc, you cut the tree and can make 5 to 10 hurleys out of each tree." Of course, not every hurley is the same—it can be like a bespoke suit ordered by discerning players.

After completing his Leaving Cert in 1973, Pat spent a memorable summer in San Francisco working for his uncle, Jim McNamara: "I arrived on the 4th of July 1973 to work for the summer with my uncle Jim (who turned 90 last year). McNamara lived in Bernal Heights and was a successful contractor. Pat recalls the joys of after-work drinking in the City back then: "Black Friday meant you would work till noon, assemble with Danny Boyle and Fintan Lawlor at the Ireland's 32 at 22nd and Guerrero" for early weekend festivities. Later in the weekend they would go down to the infamous Rathskeller next door to the Irish Embassy near the Federal Building. Eventually that period ended, and he returned again to Ireland for some work in Dublin.

In 1982, Pat took a two-year job in the Gaza Strip working with a company that built the Palestinian Cultural Center. The plight of the Palestinians there affected him deeply as a people divided by the British colonial power similar to what the Irish had experienced in their homeland.

After two years, he returned to San Francisco, and with work too plentiful to turn down he ended up staying and starting his own business here. By that time in the early 1980s Irish immigration had picked up again: "You go down to Ireland's 32 on Geary with my brother Joe, and half the people there are from your hometown! I was a joiner, a skilled carpenter, there was a lot of work back then."

As a young man in his prime he took to the field of Irish sport, which incidentally led to the most important moment of his life: I met my wife Una through the GAA in Chicago, culture brought us together!"

Pat had captained his local hurling team back home at a young age, and so when he arrived here, he was able to take up the sport again, welcome on any team. "In San Francisco I went out to Golden Gate Park, where the Gaels and the Rangers were playing. The Gaels were short a few players and asked me to join the game." That was the start of Pat's playing career here.

The team found glory on the field after an early loss. "We played in the North American championship in Boston. We lost. We swore this would never happen again." The team asked him to be captain in 1985, and they won it all. But In 1988, playing again in the North American finals, Pat broke his ankle, ending his playing career. The following year he was elected Secretary of the GAA's North American County Board, and then elected Chairman four years later.

On the subject of hurling vs. football, Pat offers this quote from Joe McDonough: "I consider Gaelic football to be merely light entertainment compared to the serious business of hurling." His love of the GAA comes from his own life

experience back home, where "you can walk up to any GAA champ," they're accessible and often come from the very communities they represent. "Ordinary people but extraordinary athletes, playing for their home county and home club." After the arrival of his children Pat devoted himself to the growth of local youth sport, helping to craft the huge success of the GAA here to the present day. Undoubtedly "the future was really secured with the building of the fields at Treasure Island eight years ago."

In 2008, Pat served as Chairman of the Treasure Island GAA Development which developed 20 acres of sports fields and a clubhouse. In 2009, he was awarded the President's Award by then President of the GAA in Croke Park, Nicky Brennan.

This is part of a growing national movement: "Adult hurling is spreading like wildfire throughout the US, they love the excitement of it. It's called 'The Riverdance of Sport."

When Irish President Mary McAleese visited Treasure Island, she observed that in the local sporting community "the greatest strength is their voluntary endeavor"—so many skilled contractors contributed so much, and the fields were seeded in six months in an extraordinary accomplishment. Pat believes that: "If an organization like the GAA can build the facility on Treasure Island, there is no reason that the Irish community cannot rebuild the Irish Center (UICC)."

Pat continues to give his talents and energy to the broader community. In 2018, he was elected Chairman of the San Francisco Famine Memorial Committee, which has selected an epic site near the Palace of the Legion of Honor for the memorial and will begin the first phase of construction in the coming months. There is little doubt that Pat will see this important project through to completion, in yet another example of his talent, dedication, and community spirit. It is a fitting honor that Pat Uniacke should walk in the 2023 St Patrick's Parade as the Grand Marshal, in due recognition of all that he has given to the community.

FATHER MICHAEL HEALY HONORED

Father Michael Healy was honored at the SFPOA Building on Friday February 17, 2023, upon his retirement from the Priesthood after more than 50 years of Illustrious Service to the Catholic Archdiocese of San Francisco.

Fr. Michael J Healy, born in Cork City, Cork Ireland was ordained in 1970 and sent to San Francisco to begin his Priestly Ministry there. Fr. Healy is extremely active in the Irish immigrant community as well as the United Irish Cultural Center where in 2019, he was honored as "Corkman" of the Year by the Rebel Cork Benevolent & Ladies Associations

He loves English Football and reportedly was quite adept as a young man before he entered the seminary and he was also a mighty champion playing Irish "Gaelic" Football. He participated in many thrilling games with the great Shannon Rangers Team in San Francisco. He relates how he introduced Irish Football to Greg Suhr (destined to become a great Police Chief of the SFPD) by them kicking the football over the spire at Saint Brendan's Church.

In the I980s and early I990s when Irish immigration to the city was at a modern peak, Father Michael was a driving force in what was called the 'Joseph and Mary' group which offered support to the new immigrants, later becoming the Irish Immigration Pastoral Center.

He has served at a Pastor at All Soul's Parish in South San Francisco (1986-1991), Pastor at St. Phillip's Parish in San Francisco (1991-2004), Pastor at St. Peter Parish in Pacifica (2004-2005), Pastor at St. Bartholomew (2005- 2019), longtime Chaplain of the SF Police Department, active Chaplain of the SF Fire Department, and Chaplain to Ancient Order of Hibernians among others.

For the past six years (2013-2020), he has served on the Advisory Board of Junipero Serra High School. In 2020, Fr. Michael celebrated his Golden Jubilee and is currently in residence at St. Stephen's parish. He retired earlier this year. He came out of a short retirement to join the SVDP Parish as Administrator from 2020-23.







DANCE ART TELLS A STORY

February 2nd, 2023 marked James Joyce's 141st birthday plus the 101st anniversary of *Ulysses*'s publication. To ring in the occasion, as part of its weeklong St. Brigid's Day Festival, the UICC welcomed Lecturer Emeritus Michael James Fallon (San Jose State) to discuss his abridgement of Joyce's complex novel. About 15 community members attended the dynamic, far-ranging discussion. The conversation focused on Professor Fallon's method for abridging *Ulysses*, plus whether such a project was possible—or even desirable. Comparisons were drawn between Professor Fallon's abridgement and the Argentine author Jorge Borges's short story "Pierre Menard, Author of the Quixote." Highlights of the evening included an appreciation of two first American editions of *Ulysses*, volumes which attendees brought to the discussion from their personal collections, as well as readings from the text, and finally, an enthusiastic comparison between episodes of *Ulysses* and tracks from The Beatles's album *Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band.*

D4 Supervisor Joel Engardio Inauguration Celebration



LOOKING TOWARDS THE FUTURE, FROM 45TH AND WAWONA

The United Irish Cultural Center building turned 48 years old on March 8, 2023. Over the past five decades, the Center has been a wonderful servant to the Irish American community and continues to be a valuable resource and important anchor point for our members and neighbors. After falling on hard times at the end of 2018, the Center has roared back to life since then. Much of the recent success has been won by the combined generosity of our members, a plethora of new Board members and dedicated volunteers. New ideas, expanded cultural programming, improved levels of service, and broad community support has now put the Center on solid ground.

Relevance to the Community

While many cultural institutions shuttered due to the pandemic, the Irish Center came through the contagion as a much stronger entity. The past four years has proven that there is plenty of appetite in the community to have a permanent place like the Center going forward. As long as the Center remains relevant to the community by providing programming that is entertaining and culturally significant, and offers educational opportunities and experiences (music, theatre, dance, art or language), then we can be safe in the knowledge that there always will be a need for such a building to serve and be supported by the community.

2025 Project: Two Years On

Many are now aware that there is a major effort going on behind the scenes to replace the existing facility with a new modern six story building. The reimagined Irish Center (or 2025 Project) redevelopment plans which were developed in 2021 outline a newly envisaged building dedicated to Irish arts and culture. The plans have been under review at the SF Planning Department since February 2022. As we near the end of the pre-permit planning process, we anticipate that we will move on to the Planning Commission by late summer. By the fall we hope to have our new building permit in hand, which will then kickstart a dedicated capital campaign that will reach from the Bay Area all the way to Ireland.

Rationale for a New Building

A new building solves one of the Centers most critical current needs: providing sufficient space for Irish arts and culture programming and local Sunset community based programming (e.g. large event celebration spaces, summer camps, ballroom dancing, and after school programs for kids). There is just not enough functional space across the 20,000 square feet we have presently to accommodate everyone. Unfortunately we have to turn away events and activities due to being previously

booked or not having available space to hold concurring events.

Being adjacent to the Pacific Ocean has not been kind to our rooftop HVAC, plumbing and electrical systems, which need constant upgrading and maintenance. While the building looks fine outwardly, there are plenty of regular issues to maintain an aging facility which has taken its toll over the years.

To make the new Irish Center more attractive as a destination and hub for the community, a sports hall, gym and aquatics center is included in the ambitious plans. A new modern contemporary building that is ADA compliant on every floor with panoramic views of the surrounding area is an easy selling point for our members.

Expanding the package of activities in "the box at the corner" of 45th and Wawona is the best way of activating the building with multi-purpose uses to sustain it well into the future. A new facility regardless of size will be a much sought after community resource. Event space for nonprofits, social

clubs, dance and music schools, fraternal and religious organizations are in short supply on the west side. We all know that the city wide priority now is the construction of housing - but how many of these developments contain space for art exhibitions, dance studios, event space music halls? We plan to build it and they will come!

Next Steps in the Process

Up until now, we have relied on generous members in our community who contributed financial resources toward the pre-construction soft costs to help us develop plans, undertake a myriad of geotechnical and engineering studies and move through the planning process. With widespread support from our members, citywide support from Mayor London Breed and local District 4 Supervisor Joel Engardio, who hope to get over the goal line later this year. Once the new building gets the green light from the City, we will only then be in a position to expand our fundraising activities to include all our supporters and community members. It is going to take one powerful effort to raise the money needed to rebuild the Irish Center. I encourage you to become a member of the Center, as we embark on what will be an amazing journey here on the west side over the next few years.

As the Irish Center celebrates another St. Patrick's Day, we look forward to engaging our community going forward to realize our dreams for a new home!

GREEN ROAD LEADS TO THE CENTER ON MARCH 12TH

The Irish band Green Road, featuring Irish opera star Clodagh Kinsella, will kick off their first American tour in the Bay Area in March. Green Road will present concerts at the Village Theatre in Danville on March 10 and at the United Irish Cultural Center (UICC) in San Francisco on March 12. Green Road will ride on the UICC float in the St. Patrick's Day Parade in San Francisco on Saturday, March 11.

Green Road's concert in the 250-seat Village Theatre in Danville sold out five weeks in advance. However, good seats remain available for their concert at the UICC on March 12.

Green Road is already a major hit in Ireland. For example, this month Green Road sold out the 855-seat National Opera House in Wexford, Ireland, weeks in advance of their concert there.

After the Bay Area, Green Road will fly to Savannah for a concert there on March 15. The concert, in a 950-seat venue, will be a fundraiser in support of Georgia Southern University's campus in County Wexford, Ireland. The event is particularly fitting. More than half of the Irish immigrants arriving in Savannah in the wake of the Potato Famine were from County Wexford, and the members of Green Road hail from County Wexford.

The final stop on Green Road's American tour will be on March 17, at the Irish Cultural Center in the Boston area, where they will headline the Irish Cultural Center's St. Patrick's Day celebrations.

Green Road's performance at the Village Theatre in Danville is in celebration of the Friendship City partnership between Danville and New Ross, Ireland. The civic partnership between Danville and New Ross grew out of cultural partnership of the Eugene O'Neill Foundation, Tao House, in Danville and the O'Neill Ancestral Trust of Ireland. The cultural partnership between the two cities, in turn, grew out of the fact that Eugene O'Neill's father James emigrated from New Ross to America as small boy.

The two nonprofit organizations hold festivals featuring Eugene O'Neill's plays in Danville in September and in New Ross, Ireland in October.

Eugene O'Neill is the only American playwright ever to win the Nobel Prize for Literature. O'Neill lived in Danville while he wrote his greatest plays, including Long Day's Journey Into Night and The Iceman Cometh.

O'Neill's home in Danville, Tao House, is now a National Historic Site managed by the National Park Service.

About the Green Road

Green Road is a five-piece ballad and folk band from Co. Wexford. They play a blend of Irish Folk favorites and tradition-



al tunes infused with a Country and Bluegrass flavor. The band has a wealth of experience. From the vibrant folk and ballad scene in Ireland's pubs and clubs, traditional sessions and Fleadh competitions across the country, and theatre and television performances at home and abroad.

PJ Sinnott is one the great singers to emerge on the contemporary Folk and Ballad scene. Combined with the lively sounds of 5 String and Tenor banjos, Flatpicked guitar, Mandolin, Uilleann Pipes and Whistles, Bass guitar and vocal harmonies, Green Road have forged a unique sound that will have you singing along from start to finish.




