# Our Irish Mail Box

## ANTRIM.

Mrs. C. White, ex-Lady Mayoress, is the city's second lady. J. P. O'Grady, Rev. R. Griffith, C. S. R., of Belfast, who has just celebrated his golden jubilee, is a native of Antrim. He was ordained a priest in 1870, and was professed a Jesuit twelve years later. He was superior at Bishop Eton, Liverpool, and at Clonard. While holding the latter office he visited Australia and New Zealand. The Antrim and Ulster Licensed Vintners' Association have increased the price of all spirits to a minimum of 15s. per glass and 15s. per bottle. There are two churches in Agohill Parish, one of which (the Rev. E. V. MacGowan, Rector) is to be extensively renovated by J. V. Brennan, M. I. I. A., architect, Belfast.

## ARMAGH.

Two recent Sunday night Sinn Fein murders were painted on a wall of the town hall, Armagh.

Armagh County Committee passed a resolution calling on the department to provide for Ireland a scheme similar to that in operation in England to repair the ravages wrought by the pest of Wight disease by the introduction of Continental bees, which are practically immune from the disease.

## CARLOW.

Military and police searched the house of Sean O'Farrell, a Carlow Sinn Feiner and Vice Chairman of the Urban Council. Mr. O'Farrell was not at home.

Carlow Farmers' Association passed a vote of sympathy with P. Fenelon, a Carlow farmer, on the death of his wife.

## CAVAN.

Andrew Reilly, Shantimon, Ballyvaughan, was tried by courtmartial in Belfast on a charge of having a copy of the Irish Volunteer in his possession. He was sentenced to a year in jail. This is another savage sentence.

Andrew Gillicec, Gortoral, Swanlinbar, was visited at night by a party of armed men, who made him swear on Rosary beads that he would bring home his son, who has joined the Royal Irish Constabulary.

Ballyconnell police made an unsuccessful attempt to capture J. M. Garvey, who had refused to pay a fine of £3 for keeping a gun without a permit.

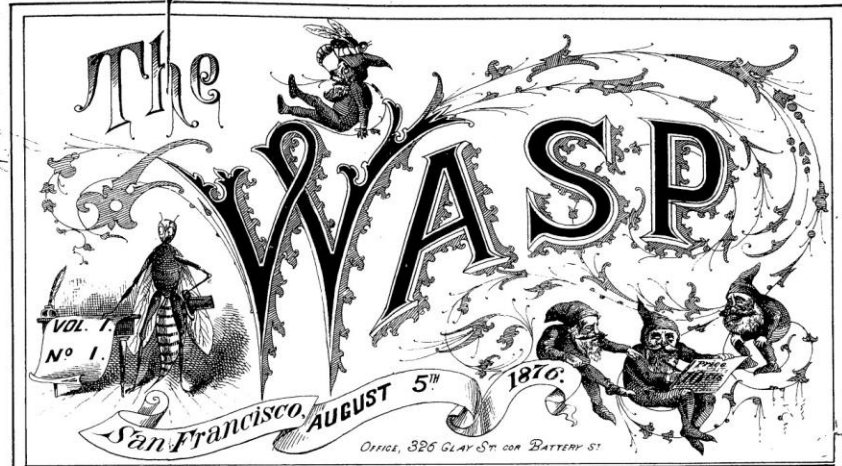
